This course offers a general introduction to the Anglophone literatures produced in the former British colonies and normally grouped under the label 'postcolonial'. The course will focus on theoretical and literary aspects associated with the literatures of these countries and will concentrate on their shared colonial history and their common postcolonial condition. Through a discussion of literary texts and critical articles from Africa, Australia, New Zealand, Canada, the Pacific Islands, the Caribbean region and South Asia, we will study and re-examine the colonial legacy and the imposition and subversion of colonial representations in the context of decolonisation, nationalism and diaspora. On completion of this module, the students will be able to explain the most important cultural, thematic and stylistic aspects associated with the literatures of these areas and to interpret the strategies used by the authors to account for their cultural specificity in the postcolonial context.

## Teaching methodology

### Classroom rules

Attendance is NOT compulsory although it is recommended.

Mobile phones and other electronic devices are NOT allowed in the classroom. Laptop computers are acceptable ONLY if used for purposes related to classroom activity. No electronic device whatsoever (including computers) is allowed in the classroom during exams/practical sessions, unless otherwise specified by the lecturer (e.g., if the practical session entails use of the internet for pedagogical purposes). Any student found using these devices for purposes unrelated to the course will be asked to leave the room.

Late arrivals are NOT welcome. Students should not enter the classroom once the session has started and will be asked to wait until the break to join the group.

ERASMUS and other International Students are reminded that the academic calendar is the same for everyone and are therefore encouraged to join the course at the beginning of the semester. Late enrolment in the course is possible but not advisable. They are also reminded that it is their responsibility to remain at the UIB until the assessment period is over.

## **Medium groups (Practice sessions)**

Students will be divided into two medium groups for the practice sessions. The composition of each group and the timetable of their practice sessions will be established at the beginning of the course and CANNOT be modified. The only exception to this rule is when there is a coincidence between the time of their practice session and another subject, in which case, students will be asked to provide written proof of this coincidence signed by the lecturer of the other course.

## Student learning assessment

### ASSESSMENT

- 1. To obtain a pass in the subject the student needs to pass BOTH exams with a 5. If only one of the partials is passed, the passed mark will be kept until both exams are passed but will not be reflected in the grades records (UIB digital). In those cases where the mathematical average is higher than 5 but one part of the exam has not been passed with 5, the student will have 4.5 in his or her marks record until the two partial exams are passed.
- 2. Partial exam 1 will take place during the course (the date will be announced in Aula Digital). Partial exam 2 will take place during the exam period in early June (periodo de evaluación complementaria). If the student fails any of these exams they can be re-taken in late June (periodo de evaluación extraordinaria). Details about the format of the exams will be provided during the course.
- 3.A research seminar will take place during the course. Attendance will amount to 10% of the final mark and will be obtained after students write a short report in groups about the contents of the seminar.





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### **IMPORTANT**

If a student fails to show up on the day and at the time established by the lecturer for the exam, the grade for that assignment/exam/practical session will be 0 (zero), in case the student has presented more than 30% of the total assigned evaluation course tasks. Only if the student has presented 30% or less than 30% of the total assigned evaluation course tasks, will the grade be 'NP'.

The dates and times of the official exams will not be altered under any circumstances, except those contemplated in the Reglament Acadèmic (Articles 29 and 30) in which case they have to be justified accordingly. Students will not be allowed into the classroom when the exam has already started. These rules apply also in the case of international or Erasmus Students who are reminded that it is their responsibility to remain at the UIB until the assessment period is over.
