#### Context

This course constitutes an introduction to grammatical studies, with special reference to (inflectional) morphology. As such, this subject is directly linked to the course Understanding English Grammar II (which deals with the study of syntax). The course begins with an introduction to morphology which is aimed at raising questions on its relation with other linguistic disciplines, such as syntax, semantics, and phonology. For this reason, students are expected to have passed the course Introduction to English Linguistics. After having defined morphology and its basic concepts and elements, close attention will be paid to inflectional morphology, within which adjectives, adverbs, nouns, and verbs will be analysed separately. A cursory look at the study of grammatical variation will accompany each of the units. Special attention will also be paid to word categorization.

## Requirements

### Recommended

Although this course has no official requirements, students are expected to have passed the courses English Language I-IV and to have successfully completed the following two courses: Introduction to English Linguistics and English Lexicology. Poor linguistic competence will be penalized.

Moreover, students are expected to have a level of English equivalent to that of the English Language course taught in the same semester as this subject. Therefore, the maximum number of serious mistakes allowed in

the tests and projects presented in Understanding English Grammar I will be 6, the same as that established in the syllabus of English Language V.

## Teaching methodology

The course will be organised as follows:

1) **Theory classes** (large group), devoted mainly to the theoretical study of the most complex grammatical points included in the syllabus. These sessions will also include some practice tasks.

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2) **Seminars** (practical classes), where the focus will be on students. Studentsare expected to read a selection of academic texts related to the different units of the syllabus and engage in the discussion of their content. In addition, students will be required to do and design exercises based on the syllabus.

## Important note

**Mobile phones** and other electronic devices are **NOT allowed** in the classroom. Laptop computers are acceptable ONLY if used for purposes related to classroom activity. No electronic device whatsoever (including computers) is allowed in the classroom during exams/practical sessions unless otherwise specified by the lecturer (e.g., if the practical session entails the use of the internet for pedagogical purposes).

## Specific risks and protective measures

## Student learning assessment

This course offers two assessment pathways:

#### Pathway A

All full-time students will take this option.

#### Pathway B

Students officially recognised by the UIB as part-time students may choose this assessment option. In this case, students are not expected to regularly attend or actively participate in sessions. Pathway B students will take the two tests specified for Pathway A students and, additionally, 20% of their final grade will result from an essay they will submit at the end of the term, based on the academic readings provided in the syllabus or an academic article of their choice (to be approved by the lecturer) related to one of the topics studied.

Those interested in this assessment option will need to present the lecturer with a formal application in the first two weeks of the term. This application will include documentary evidence proving that they find themselves in one of the situations making students eligible for part-time student status (https://seu.uib.cat/es/Cataleg-de-Procediments/). The Vice-Dean for English Studies will consider all applications and decide whether applicants should be granted part-time student status. Upon notification, Pathway B students will be asked to sign a learning agreement (available from Aula Digital) committing themselves to the special assessment criteria this pathway involves.

#### **IMPORTANT NOTES:**

- 1. If a student fails to show up on the day and at the time scheduled by the lecturer for the exams or mid-term assignments, the grade for that exam or assignment will be 0 (zero), in case the student has presented more than 30% of the total assigned evaluation course tasks. Only if the student has presented 30% or less than 30% of the total assigned evaluation course tasks, will the grade be NP.
- 2. All students must pass both the mid-term exam and the final exam (minimum mark = 5). In those cases where the mathematical average is higher than 5 but either the mid-term exam or the final exam has been failed, the student will have 4.5 in their marks record.
- 3. The dates and times of the official exams will not be altered under any circumstances, except those contemplated by the Reglament Acadèmic. Each student who requires a change of date and/or time must do so through the appropriate administrative procedures.
